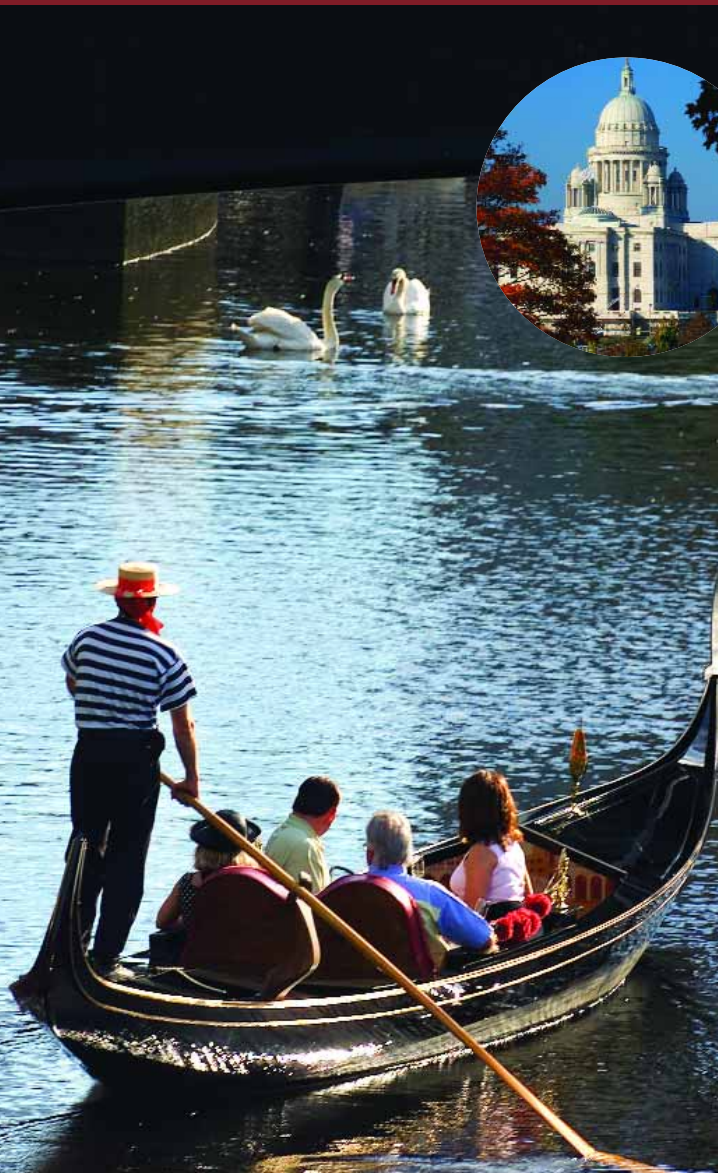

Pre-Conference Workshops

Pre-Conference PC1: Cost Analysis in Health Services Research: Perspectives for Nursing Research

The importance and value of an economic perspective in conducting health services and nursing research will be stressed in this two-part interactive session on cost analysis.

PART 1 Cost Analysis: An overview. In the first part of this session a general overview of the techniques of cost analysis in health services research with a specific focus on nursing research will be provided. The techniques of cost of illness analysis, cost-benefit analysis, cost-effectiveness analysis and cost-utility analysis will be presented. Each technique will be described, the strengths and limitations of each approach identified along with examples of appropriate application to specific kinds of research questions provided. Participants will be encouraged to discuss their research and provide examples of how these techniques can best be used to enhance their research.

PART 2 The application of cost benefit analysis in health policy research. The second part of this session will be an application of a specific cost analysis. A cost benefit analysis will be applied to a policy that affects health care services delivered by Advanced Practice Nurses. In this session participants will learn to recognize when a cost analysis is appropriate to include in their research, the questions to ask in an analysis, the variables to consider, how to analyze and interpret the results and how to incorporate their findings into recommendations to improve service delivery.

Pre-Conference PC2: Integrating Evidence-Based Practice into Nursing Curricula: It Takes a Community

At the Lienhard School of Nursing at Pace University we have been integrating evidence-based practice (EBP) into our curricula. This workshop focuses on the process of changing traditional nursing research courses at the graduate and undergraduate levels into courses using an EBP framework. In this paradigm students and graduates are considered evidence users, not evidence generators. The specific aim of the workshop is to help faculty rethink and revise their research courses using an EBP approach. The workshop will begin with a short introduction, defining what we mean by EBP. The first presentation will focus on the importance of creating a culture that can embrace change, and use change theory to depict the process of curriculum revision we engaged in over a 5-year period. Then we will share how we integrated EBP into the

research courses in chronological order, starting with the second presentation, which shares the changes made in the graduate and combined degree program (CDP) research courses. In addition we will describe our approach to leveling research and EBP content in the two curricula. The third presentation focuses on the changes made in the undergraduate research course. Then we will share how a philosophy of teaching/learning is related to the specific learning activities and assignments that we use to bring EBP and the research process together as a meaningful experience for learners. In addition, specific teaching strategies and assignments will give workshop participants usable teaching materials to bring home to help them with integration of EBP into their courses. We will conclude with a presentation that demonstrates how learning activities/assignments used in the research courses are applied in the clinical courses in our graduate Family Nurse Practitioner program and in the undergraduate clinical courses.

Pre-Conference PC3: Critiquing Federal Grant Proposals in Community and Family Interdisciplinary Research: Sharing Next Steps and Lessons Learned

This pre-conference, sponsored by the Community Based Participatory Research Interest Group and the Family Research Interest Group, will be the second time the two interest groups will join in a collaborative research exchange. The Family Research Interest Group has traditionally hosted a pre-conference in which critique is used as a way for researchers at various stages of development to share their knowledge and experience, offer suggestions, and gain encouragement related to their scholarly work. This year, three researchers will present their NIH grant proposals, each submitted through a different funding mechanism — R01, R21, R03. The researchers will share details on selection of an appropriate grant mechanism, the application process, and an overview of their proposal, followed by shared critique and open dialogue with fellow

community and family researchers. The group critique assists the presenters in refining their grant applications as well as generating ideas that will advance their program of scholarly work. This interactive pre-conference will provide an opportunity to demystify and enlighten family and community researchers about NIH funding and proposal development. Ways to enhance proposals through collaboration between family and community researchers, and interdisciplinary team members will be explored. Particular emphasis will be placed on using these partnerships and NIH to advance nursing science. The pre-conference will conclude by identifying directions for future collaboration between the Community Based Participatory Research Interest Group and the Family Research Interest Group.

Pre-Conference PC4: Powerful Data, Meaningful Answers: An Introduction to the Healthcare Cost and Utilization Project (HCUP)

This session will provide an introduction to the Healthcare Cost and Utilization Project (HCUP, pronounced "H-Cup"), health care databases and related software tools. HCUP is developed through a Federal-State-Industry partnership and sponsored by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ). It is the largest collection of longitudinal hospital care data in the United States and the databases enable research on a broad range of health issues, including cost and quality of health services, medical practice patterns, access to health care, and outcomes of treatments at the national, State, and local market levels. HCUP databases include the State Inpatient Databases, the Nationwide Inpatient Database, the Kids' Inpatient Database, the State Ambulatory Surgery Databases, and the State Emergency Department Databases. The session will also familiarize participants with several HCUP software tools created for use with administrative data. The course includes a demonstration of HCUPnet—the free, online query system that provides instant access to national, regional, and state-level hospital inpatient statistics based on HCUP data (<http://hcup.ahrq.gov/HCUPnet.asp>). Participants will

receive a free CD-ROM containing valuable resources that expand on topics covered in the session, including data file descriptions, research examples that use HCUP data, information on how to access documentation, and instructions on how to obtain HCUP data and tools.

Pre-Conference PC5: Achieving Success in the Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) Era: A Workshop for Building Collaborations with Nurse Researchers and Statistical Consultants

Nurses engaging in research activities are often challenged. In most settings, success depends on collaborations, grant funding, publications, and research productivity. The Magnet Recognition Program deems the integration of nursing research and evidence-based practice into operations and clinical processes as fundamental to achieving excellence in nursing. Nursing research is pivotal in achieving high quality outcomes, patient satisfaction, and the advancement of scientific knowledge. We will describe our new Nursing Research Scholars Award (NRSA) program that has become the foundation for our involvement in the National Institutes of Health (NIH) Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) program. The NRSA and CTSA have interrelated missions—to educate and develop the next generation of [nurse] researchers (NR). In most settings, interdisciplinary collaborations are a key tool for conducting research and translating discoveries into practice. This session will use an interactive, case-based format to discuss a process for collaborating with NRs and SCs as a tool for achieving success. The workshop will be led by an experienced NR and a nurse/SC with extensive collaborative experience. A second experienced NR will share, via video-conferencing/DVD, experiences developing a nursing research program with statistical support at an academic medical center. The goal of this workshop is to provide participants with the tools, strategies, and vision to develop and sustain successful collaborations with NRs and SCs that lead to success in the CTSA era. We will address the following objectives with a workshop audience of nursing graduate students, nurse researchers, and junior/mid-level/senior faculty: 1. Explore approaches that may be used to identify NR and SC collaborators; 2. Discuss goal setting to enhance the collaboration and assure success for all collaborators; 3. Discuss how to work effectively with a SC to adequately power, budget and fund studies; and 4. Identify challenges in the collaboration and discuss their management.

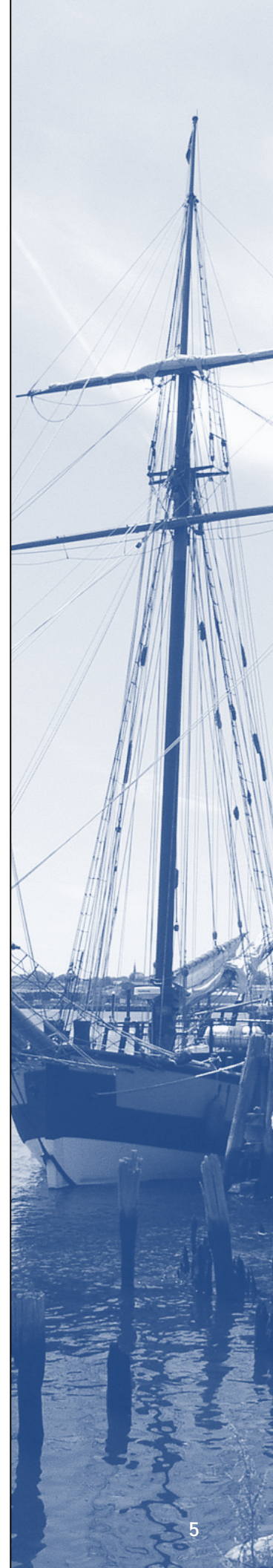
Pre-Conference PC6: Expanding Ways of Knowing as Evidence for Practice
