This meeting is an opportunity to hear how NINR/NIH, AHRQ/HHS, and HRSA/HHS funds are being spent to advance high quality health care for all.

WORKSHOP 1:

Conducting Research with Persons Who Have Alzheimer's Disease Using Behavioral Observation Methods: Overcoming Methodological Challenges

This pre-conference workshop is intended to facilitate the conduct of behavioral observation research; to evaluate clinical interventions; to decrease two behavioral symptoms of agitation and resistiveness to care, and the consequences of these behavioral symptoms of dementia, discomfort and pain. Content will: (1) describe the unique behavioral symptoms presented by persons with AD that require the use of behavioral observation scales to evaluate the efficacy of clinical interventions; (2) explain the use of behavioral observation scales to measure agitation, resistiveness to care, discomfort, and pain; and (3) address how to overcome data problems rather reliability issues, procedures for inter-rater reliability, and other anticipated statistical issues to be considered in analysis. Participants will learn the theoretical basis and practical strategies for using behavioral observation scales for AD research, to include to conceptual approach to management of challenging behaviors in dementia. Measurement options will be reviewed as well as rater selection, training, evaluation, and procedures for inter-rater reliability checks will be also addressed.

WORKSHOP 2:

Improving Quality of Life for Older Adults through Health Promotion

This pre-conference session brings together a number of nurse researchers who have focused their work on improving quality of life by promoting the health of older adults. We begin with a discussion of a model for behavior change and health promotion that can potentially guide practice and research. Strategies to reduce daytime sleepiness, promote oral health incognitively impaired elders. Improve mood in home-bound elderly and encourage exercise participation are explored within the context of presenters' programs of research. Also addressed are ways of helping older adults effectively use the web for health information, and methods of measuring well-being. This session should be of interest to all nurses who practice or conduct research with older adults.

WORKSHOP 3:

Reliability and Validity Testing Using Structural Equation Modeling (SEM)

Structural equation modeling is a comprehensive way in which to test the relationship among variables. Unlike analysis of variance or multiple regression, which models individual observations, the primary aim of structural equation modeling is to model covari-

ances. This involves proposing a set of relationships and evaluating their consistency with the relations in an observed covariance matrix. This session will review the history of SEM, and how SEM can be used to test the reliability and validity of specific measures. Specific examples using real data bases will be provided to complete reliability testing using R^2 and validity using confirmatory factor analysis as well as factor loadings. The advantage of SEM in measurement is that the SEM approach acknowledges measurement error, all measurement equations are solved simultaneously, and the researcher can explicitly direct and thereby test what items are related to any given concept. Participation will give the researcher a base of understanding of how to incorporate SEM in testing new and/or revised measures.

WORKSHOP 4:

Family Research: An Opportunity for Critique and Dialogue

This pre-conference will target doctoral students and recent post-doctoral nurse researchers who have completed their degrees or training within the last five years and are interested in family or family-related research. The purpose of this pre-conference is to support the development of nurse investigators who are early in their careers of family research.

Afternoon Sessions

WORKSHOP 5:

Partnership of Theory and Practice: Integration and Application

Expanding Grand Theories, such as the Roy Adaption Model provides a foundation for substantive exploration of the derivation of related middle-range and practice level theories. These derived models will be analyzed in terms of meaning for contemporary nursing practice. A substantive example assists the learner in envisioning the integration of theory into a specific clinical setting as well as providing guidance for a research project. The Roy Model provides the framework for action research in an administrative context focusing on change strategies.

In addition the accommodation of middle-range and practice theories is considered within the current trend of evidence-based practice and codification of nursing practice. The difficulty of accommodating knowledge and perspectives generated within middle-range theories into evidence hierarchies is illustrated. Potential influences on the nursing discipline will be proposed relating to the impact of multiple mid-range theories and evidence-based guidelines without an overarching nursing framework or visible core value structure. An interactive process will be used to expand this list of possibilities and consider strategies to capture practice knowledge and integrate with formalized knowledge representations.

WORKSHOP 6:

Historical Methods: Research as Context for Quality Care

This pre-conference workshop will identify aspects of nursing history and historiography that are important to current nursing scholarship, quality of care and practice. Sessions will focus on comparing and contrasting historical research methods with other research methods, and describing the steps for preparing to implement a historical research project. There will be a discussion of the types of sources used in historical research, the organization of archives, locating, and accessing historical documents, incorporating archival material into research publications and methods for preserving current nursing documents. Lastly, although similar to other research interview techniques, Oral History Methodology has different characteristics and challenges, particularly in relation to human subjects protection concerns. Oral history methods will be examined and ethical consideration addressed.



WORKSHOP 7:

WORKSHOP 8:
Advancing Your Qualitative Analysis: A Participatory Workshop

Much of the current published qualitative research is preoccupied with rigor and thinly analyzed, yielding little guidance for practice or research. A critical review of qualitative findings can help analysts begin to move beyond categorization to create evocative portraits of tension and variation in human experiences and situations. The purpose of this workshop is to provide an overview of levels of complexity in qualitative findings and then to sensitize participants to areas of growth in analytic skills. The target audience is nurses actively involved in qualitative analysis.
